The Louis and Barbara Thiel Distinguished Service Award is presented annually to community members who demonstrate exemplary character, continuity of leadership and long-term service to Greenville and its environs. The recipients must demonstrate a commitment to the common good above private interests. The award is named after Louis and Barbara Thiel, whose generosity made the founding of Thiel College possible in 1866. The Thiels dedicated themselves to the welfare of others. The German couple immigrated to western Pennsylvania in the 1840s, and as their work was blessed with success, they faithfully served family, community, and the church.

The Pittsburgh Promise promotes high educational aspirations among City of Pittsburgh high school graduates by funding scholarships for post-secondary education access. Students can use their Pittsburgh Promise scholarship to attend any accredited college, university, trade or technical school in Pennsylvania.

Pittsburgh has the largest Promise program in the United States.

Thiel College is one of the Pittsburgh Promise's 24 Preferred College Partners. Preferred College

Partners are post-secondary institutions that make two specific commitments over and above what they already do to ensure the success of Promise Scholars. Preferred partner schools provide a minimum \$2,000 grant per year for room and board to Promise-eligible students and push targeted transition and academic support services to Promise-eligible students. Students who are first in their families to pursue higher education, or who come from low-income contexts, often struggle in persisting after their first year of college. Data show that certain support systems and practices significantly increase their likelihood of success. The two stated requirements for receiving "preferred" status are primary predictors for increasing student success among vulnerable populations.

Accepting the Louis and Barbara Thiel Distinguished Service Award for the Pittsburgh Promise is Saleem Ghubril. He is the executive director and a passionate advocate for children and the City of Pittsburgh. An ordained Presbyterian minister, he has devoted his life to serving the people of his community through outreach and education programs. In 1985, he founded The Pittsburgh Project, a community development organization that provides free home renovations to hundreds of vulnerable seniors each year and deploys thousands of youth in meaningful volunteer community service. Ghubril is the volunteer co-pastor of Mosaic Community Presbyterian Church in Pittsburgh and is a member of the boards of The Buhl Foundation, Vibrant Pittsburgh, and the World Affairs Council of Pittsburgh.

The fund has provided more than \$141.3 million in higher education scholarships to 9,503 Pittsburgh Public School graduates since 2008, including many at Thiel College. More than 3,200 Pittsburgh Promise recipients have graduated from higher education programs and are working in the Pittsburgh region, according to figures provided by the fund.

Distinguished Professor of the Year



David Miller'61

Professor of Economics and Business Administration and Norman P. Mortensen Chair of Economics **David Miller**'61 has taught and advised more students than any professor in Thiel College's history. He has been teaching since 1963, which is the longest tenure for a professor since the College was founded in 1866.

Miller's distinctive voice and mannerisms have made him a campus legend. He has been immortalized on t-shirts, with bobbleheads and in impersonation contests, but it is his dedication to the students he has advised and taught in the classroom that truly makes him one the most beloved teachers the institution has ever known. In 2016, the College endowed a chair in Professor Miller's name. This unprecedented honor was spearheaded by a group of grateful alumni.

Professor Miller earned his undergraduate degree from Thiel College in 1961 and an M.B.A. from the University of Pittsburgh in 1962. He has also done additional graduate study at Kent State University.

Miller's outreach extends beyond the classroom. Above and beyond the teaching and advising he provides for students, Miller was a key figure in the creation of the Haller Enterprise Institute, which annually awards scholarships to entrepreneurial students and recognizes Thiel College student entrepreneurs and successful business people from around the region.

Miller and his wife, **Ruth**, live in Jamestown, Pa. and have two adult children, **Michael '92 and Joy '90.**

Michelle Lentz

Michelle Lentz is an Adjunct Professor of Presentational Literacy. Presentational Literacy is required by all first-year students. It focuses on developing basic presentational skills (including poster presentations, mock interviews, as well as more traditional types of presentations). In addition to basic presentational skills,

she focuses on building a sense of community within her classes as well as developing students' self-confidence. She has been teaching at Thiel since the fall of 2016 and this year, has also taught business and technical writing for the Department of English.

Her contributions go beyond the classroom. Lentz and her husband, **Josh**, founded and run Christian Fitness Ministries and support other outreach within community as needs are brought to their attention, which includes a \$500 donation to the Thiel College food pantry. She is a fundraiser and grant writer for the backpack program for Greenville Elementary students and is a Baughman Foundation Grant Review Committee member.

Lentz enjoys watching her sons play soccer and basketball together and attending Zumba class with a great group of inspiring women (including **Tressa Snyder** and **Liz Frombgen, Ph.D.**, among many others).

She got her Bachelor of Arts in English and secondary education/literature from Grove City College in 1994 and a Master of Science in instructional leadership from Robert Morris University in 2000.

Lentz and her husband live in Greenville with their two children, **Logan** (15) and **Jonah** (17).

Distinguished Scholar Ellen Lippert, Ph.D.

Ellen Lippert is a familiar face to many. She has taught at Thiel College since 2006, but also because she has been a frequent presenter at Thiel College academic gatherings. She has discussed British history and culture, art and the work on her book.

She published a book on the 19th-century potter American potter George Ohr and written three other articles about him. She was published in the Journal of Modern Craft. It is the first peer-reviewed academic journal that provides an international and interdisciplinary forum for pottery. She has spoken about Ohr at the Gardiner Museum, which is Canada's national ceramics museum and the Ohr-O'Keefe Museum in Biloxi, Miss. Her article, "Souvenirs of Fantasy: George Ohr's Clay Tokens," will be published in Token and Medal Society Journal, and she has been asked to speak at the National Arts and Crafts Conference in Asheville, N.C.

She has been the Chair of the Department of Art since 2014.

She earned a Bachelor of Science in geology and ceramics from Juniata College (1998) and a Bachelor of Arts in art history from Juniata College (1999). Lippert got her Master of Art in art history from the University of Pittsburgh in 2002. She earned her doctorate from Case Western Reserve University in Cleveland in 2009.

She and her husband, **Doug**, live in Cranberry Township, Pa. with their three children, **Eli, Adeline** and **Asher**. They recently added a new puppy to their household. In her spare time, she enjoys reading, especially books by Stephen King.

Kristin M. Carlson, Ph.D.

Kristin M. Carlson came to Thiel College in 2015 when she was named Assistant Professor of Languages and Chair of the Department of Languages, but one of her nomination forms included another title that would be appropriate, "ambassador."

Carlson is one of the professors teaching seminar classes to firstyear students and also works with international students on campus.

At Thiel, she developed a Spanish minor. In addition to that, she has written articles on Spanish for textbooks and journals and completed the American English Institute Global Teacher Training Program and is certified as an American English Institute instructor. She studied Spanish literature and culture at La Universidad Complutense in Madrid, Spain. Carlson has also traveled to Cuba, Mexico, Costa Rica, Puerto Rico, France, Spain, Germany and Austria. She got her Bachelor of Arts in Spanish from Rider University in 1995. She earned a Master of Arts in Spanish linguistics from Purdue University in 2006 and completed her doctoral work in Spanish linguistics at Purdue in 2014.

Carlson lives in Greenville with her husband and 9-year-old and 6-year-old daughters. Away from Thiel, she enjoys spending time with family and friends, gardening and exploring nature.
